

Think Systemically:

MISSION: VISION

What is your vision of the future and does it inspire your people?

Leaders must create a clear and compelling vision around which the organization can unite and move forward. The vision should be something that inspires, motivates, and challenges employees. A vision is future-oriented, describing an optimal desired state. A shared vision is one in which everyone strives to reach that desired state.

How do you translate your organization's vision into priorities for action?
